Third meeting of the Policy-Maker Platform (PMP3) Topics: governance, net-zero, economic transition

Thursday, 28 February 2019 – 10:00 to 17:00 – Venue: EEA, Copenhagen

CONTEXT: This is the third (and for the moment final) meeting of the Policy-Maker Platform (PMP) under the Climate Recon 2050 project. The PMP is meant to bring together representatives from governmental agencies of different Member States who are (or have been) involved in the process of drafting and implementing their national long-term climate strategies. The PMP's purpose is to act as a forum for exchange on experiences gained and lessons learnt - to foster an intra-European dialogue on the core issues of 2050 decarbonisation strategies.

The key topics to be addressed in this PMP session:

- \Rightarrow Governance of long-term strategies: the role of dedicated institutions
- \Rightarrow Structural change: addressing economic impacts of transitions in 2050 strategies
- \Rightarrow plus an **outlook** into possible future activities

The PMP takes place in concert with a **Technical Dialogue** between scenario builders and modellers (that government actors are welcome to join) – as back-to-back workshops with connections through topics and participants. Previous iterations of these meetings have taken place in Berlin (April 2018) and Warsaw (October 2018). A conference in Brussels concludes the current project phase in May 2019.

The 3rd meeting of the Technical Dialogue is to take place on 27th of February, the day before the PMP. It will focus on three main topics:

- \Rightarrow Modelling economic impacts and distributive effects
- $\Rightarrow\,$ Lifestyles and sufficiency as a mitigation vector in 2050 scenarios
- \Rightarrow Reaching "net-zero" emissions, concept and key issues

We invite PMP participants to join the Technical Dialogue, and in particular to consider joining the **afternoon session on NET ZERO** on the day before, if time and travel arrangements allow.

We invite participants of both days to join for **dinner** on 27th of February – venue to be decided.
